me of the first time I saw young children in 'revival'. While pastoring in Germany, another minister and I went to southern Italy to hold a week's worth of evangelistic meetings on an Air Force base there. By the third night many souls had been saved, as wells as several amazing healing miracles, and still others experienced the Holy Spirit for the

healing miracles, and still others experienced the Holy Spirit for the first time. But what was to me the most impressive was a small band of young children, led by a little girl barely 8 or 9, praying for

one another in a corner of the altar. Tears streamed down their faces, tiny voices cried out in worship, but most exciting were several suddenly speaking in tongues and proclaiming Biblical truths beyond their years.

In that moment I fully understood what Jesus meant when He said, "(Let them come to me)...for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." (Mat 19:14) Look at all the things He said about child-like faith just one chapter before (Mat 18:1-5). From that time I have continued to tell the young, "Don't hold back, don't be intimidated by adults, don't think you're not 'old enough' to believe and do great things for God. It is we 'grown-ups' who have a lot to learn about faith from you.

too, may help. Find missionaries whose primary ministry is to this poorest of countries, get your church involved, but most of all - pray, pray, pray!!

- 7. You sort your friends by continent.
- 8. Fitting 15 or more people into a car seems normal.
- 9. You don't think that two hours is a long sermon.
- 10. You think VISA is a document stamp in your passport.
- 11. You go to a church and find your picture on the bulletin board.
- 12. You refer to gravel roads as 'highways'.
- 13. Your family sends you Kool Aid and peanut butter for your birthday.
- 14. You know that having a nice car is safer but will cause you to lose some 'support'.

"Occupy Until I Come"

Those who heard Jesus near the end of His earthly ministry thought that the kingdom of God "should immediately appear" (Luke 19:11) They were filled with expectation and hope, even as we are today, anxious for the advent of Gods kingdom on earth and the fulfillment of all His cherished promises. But, until then, there is work to be done! So, Jesus shares with us the 'Parable of the Pounds' (Luke 19:12 -27), about a "certain nobleman" who assigned his ten servants to the task of increasing his kingdom, giving to each the same portion and requiring of each the same faithfulness.

His instructions, "occupy until I come", meant for us to be hard at work with persistent determination. Every attitude necessary to be successful in earthly business (such as prudence, prioritizing, strategy) the Lord expects of us in His heavenly business. There is no place for slothfulness where outcomes have eternal consequences! In our own work in the mission field we have tried to take care to use every opportunity, redeem every moment, wanting to never forget the full gravity of this work: it is, after all, for keeps!!

Oh, to imitate the Apostle Paul, who "served the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears and temptations... (and) kept back nothing that was profitable."(Ac 20:19-21) His testimony of sacrifice and endurance (Ac 20:22-24: 2Cor 11:23-28) challenges each of us to evaluate ourselves and ask, "Am I really doing all I can do?"

Our own missionary work has certainly not been easy (nine hurricanes, a shipwreck at sea, chased by waterspouts, and plenty more.) But in each of those times we considered Paul's confession, "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy ... " (Ac 20:24) He knew that the 'trials of his trade' were necessary for his spiritual growth and therefore determined to "take pleasure in infirmities. in reproaches. in necessities, in persecutions, in distress for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then I am strong " (2Cor. 12:10) There are no shortcuts to spiritual maturity, nor in the service of His kingdom!!

Thus, let us gladly "occupy until He comes", pressing through whatever may come before us, happily finishing our "course with joy". After all, there really isn't anything in this life, sufferings or otherwise, "worthy to be compared to the glory which shall be revealed in us" (Rom. 8:18)
